## Hard or Soft?

In his book, "Hard America Soft America – Competition vs. Coddling and the Battle for the Nation's Future," Michael Barone compares and contrasts a number of areas in which our country has either taken a soft (coddling) stance or a hard (competitive) stance. Basically, his supposition is that any program or entity that simply gives somebody something for nothing or has a lower set of standards to by which to operate, is promoting a "Soft" society. The argument is that for most things to be successful, one should have to compete and earn whatever he/she works toward. This makes sense. How hard is someone going to work for something if it is simply given to him or her? Barone's argument is that when given the opportunity to live in a Hard America and have to compete, or live in a Soft America and be coddled, many would obviously choose to be coddled.

It is during the "Soft times" that things tend to not do so well, however. Education is a system that has gone through this and continues to go through this. Barone sites many examples of our educational system turning away from a Hard demanding academic program and turning to a "Soft" progressive educational system that accepts and moves toward mediocrity, as opposed to being demanding and striving towards excellence. Barone states that one of the reasons for this shift is due to schools "denouncing rote memorization and drill arguing that children should learn on their own." It was also pointed out that schools became more interested in tending to the self esteem of the students and less interested in their academic success.

Barone also pointed out that teacher unions played a key in the softening of the American education system. The unions provided a "Soft" situation where Barone says "all employees are interchangeable and must be treated the same. This meant that management could not discriminate between workers, and therefore forbade merit pay and required teacher assignment strictly on the basis of seniority. The immediate effect was that workers and teachers had more "Soft protection." The public schools were not prepared to adapt to "Hard" competition when it emerged."

Schools had no accountability and were content to keep going down the path of progressive/self-esteem based education. That is until The National Commission on Excellence in Education released *A Nation at Risk* in 1983. This report started to turn heads and thus started a movement, be it ever so slow, from a Soft stance within education to a "Hard" one. National standards started to appear. These ultimately failed however, because they too were "Soft." People continued to cry out for better schools and more choices. So the government, on a state level, began to get involved.

Due to the desire to have better alternatives than what the Soft public education arena was offering, the idea of charter schools, home schooling and school vouchers came forth. Barone recounts that "Free-market economist Milton Friedman long ago came up with the concept of school voucher: instead of assigning children to public schools according to their place of residence, give their parents a voucher worth the amount of a year's schooling and let them choose which school – public or private – their children attend. In other words, replace monopoly with choice, bureaucracy with a market." Barone goes on to say that because of these types of things - "For the first time, the people running the public schools faced competition, which threatened the flow of money into their systems. They were being dragged, however slowly and despite their dogged resistance, toward Hard America.

Time and time again throughout this book, Michael Barone points out that the Hard America approach is what made many entities successful. To coin an old phrase, "There ain't no such thing as a free lunch." At Liberty Common School, we feel to adequately prepare students to function in society, we need to teach them knowledge, hard work, discipline, self-reliance and resourcefulness.



been picked a schedule will be released with times your team will play




The first Saturday will be a practice day. Fundamentals will be taught to the teams
